RAISE 



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[19 April 2020] Sunday Gospel - John 20:19-31

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you', and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you. 'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him: 'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

# Reflection

I find it quite interesting that we are in a similar predicament as the disciples in today's Gospel locked behind closed doors. The "circuit breaker" has made the past two weeks different for many of us adjusting to home-based learning or working from home, not being able to meet up with friends and not being able to receive the sacraments. We feel trapped, lonely and unsettled. Perhaps it's even difficult to celebrate this season of Easter. Where is the joy and freedom amidst all that we are facing? How is it possible for Jesus to be real and alive in such a crisis? Just like Thomas, we too have missed the Risen Christ.

In the Gospel today, we see that it is Jesus who reaches out and meets his disciples where they are at, not just once but twice! Jesus does not abandon us in our fears and doubts. He desires to bring us peace and hope amidst all the uncertainty that we are facing. Even in our struggle to trust, Jesus invites us to place our hand into his side so that we too may believe and have life in him. It is there, in his glorious wounds, that we encounter the great love and mercy that God has for us.



Today, we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday too. Let us continue to entrust ourselves and this Covid-19 situation to the mercy of God. We know that He will not leave us in these trying times. Even in this crushing and pressing, God is bringing new wine out of us. He is creating new opportunities for us to love and appreciate those around us, especially our families. It is with this hope that we can continue to live joyfully amidst the darkest of times. Today, we boldly claim that our fears and doubts do not have a hold on us because Jesus Christ is truly alive! Alleluia, alleluia!
